JOB DESCRIPTION

1. You are responsible for the participation of your unit in the Makahiki. Follow the established plan along with the simple rules and guidelines.
2. Work with your unit committee and leaders to select an activity for your unit's area demonstration and display. Motivate, inspire, and encourage the full involvement of parents, youth members and leaders.
3. Solicit a sponsor for your unit's area. Confirm your unit's participation by submitting the Makahiki application form along with the required registration fees.
4. Plan ahead by recruiting the necessary "people-power".
5. Coordinate and develop a list of materials, equipment, and supplies necessary for your unit's area demonstration and display.
6. Keep in touch with your unit's ticket sales chairperson. This person needs to know what you are planning. Scouts are personally inviting ticket buyers to come to the Makahiki to see their unit's demonstration and display. Knowing what the area is about generates more enthusiasm among all unit members.
7. Involve unit members in planning and preparing the unit's area. Use their ideas, and provide them with opportunities for advancement and personal growth. Recognize all youth members involved and give them credit for their accomplishments.
8. Provide critique and final report to aid in future Makahiki plans.

Booth applications are due by _____ for Hamakua Kohala and Kona, and _____ for Pukahi Districts. Areas are assigned on a first reservation - first assigned basis. Displays are to be interactive games, crafts or activities.

MAKAHIKI GUIDELINES

Youth Protection:

Youth Protection Training is required for ALL adults camping overnight. **Youth Protection** training is available online at www.scouting.org.

MEDICAL REQUIREMENTS:

DO NOT SUBMIT MEDICAL FORMS TO ALOHA COUNCIL SERVICE CENTER OR SCOUT SHOP

Maintenance of good health at Makahiki is of utmost importance, and it is with this objective in mind that the following minimum requirements must be enforced:

- Each participant will be expected to complete the BSA Annual Health and Medical Record (Part A and B only) and submit to the unit leader in charge during the Makahiki. The health history must be current.
- This form includes a parental consent to participate in BSA programs. A photo copy of each individual's insurance card must be included.
- The form is to be completed and signed by parents or legal guardians.
- Primary medical insurance benefits for qualified claims are paid first, by the individual's policy and second, by the unit chartering organization.
- All participants at Makahiki will wear shoes with closed toes and heels.
- Use of the "buddy" system is enforced.

CONCESSION:

A Food concession will be conveniently available. Food and soft drinks will be available for purchase.

CODE OF CONDUCT:

- Observe the Scout Oath or Promise, and the Scout Law.
- Wear my official uniform throughout the Makahiki.
- Participate in all activities.
- Be personally responsible for breakage, damage, or loss of property.
- Only park in the designated parking areas while at the Makahiki.
- Follow the BSA's policy on smoking. There will be no smoking on site.
- The purchase, possession or consumption of alcohol beverages or illicit drugs at the Makahiki is prohibited and will result in immediate expulsion from the Makahiki. This standard shall apply to all youth and adult participants. Compliance with state law and site regulations will apply at all times.
- The use of fireworks and personal firearms is prohibited.
- Gambling is prohibited.

BUDDY SYSTEM:

Use of the buddy system during the Makahiki will be enforced. Any youth found without a buddy will be escorted back to their unit leader. Unit leaders should advise their youth about this.

MAKAHIKI GUIDELINES

HEALTH AND SAFETY, RULES AND REGULATIONS:

It is important to know the rules and regulations and to observe the safety guidelines. Health and safety must be the primary concern of everyone involved in the Makahiki. All BSA Policies will be enforced. Please refer to the [Guide to Safe Scouting](#) for details.

1. Adult supervision is required at all times.
2. Good housekeeping, proper rubbish disposal, fire resistant construction, and flameproof materials are some of the controlling factors that will be required of each display. Inspections could be made by the fire department prior and during the show for your safety.
3. All drapes, hangings, branches, paper, etc. must be treated to retard fire. When you buy decorations, be sure they are "flame retardant".
4. Each unit is responsible for keeping its area clean at all times. All rubbish must be thrown away.
5. All equipment brought to the Makahiki by your unit must be removed at the conclusion of the show.
6. Unit sales of any kind are prohibited. Offering samples of food, handicraft materials, and printed materials is encouraged, but must be free.
7. Use of power tools should be kept to a minimum. Use of gasoline power tools is prohibited. It is mandatory that all battery power tools be used under adult supervision, and out of reach of the general public.
8. Special attention should be given to exhibits that require the use of projectiles, such as beanbags, blunt darts, or rubber-band guns. Adequate space must be provided to ensure a safe firing line, as well as strict adult supervision.
9. Safety goggles must be used in exhibits involving metal striking metal, as in driving nails. Wooden or leather mallets are a must for leather tooling unless goggles are used.
10. Clean up is the responsibility of everyone. Exhibits areas must be completely cleaned at the closing of the show. All refuse must be properly disposed.

SUGGESTIONS FOR DISPLAY AREA

The following are display program ideas. These are only suggestions. The display should be a place full of action and fun activities for all participants. Be creative and make your display, activity and/or demonstration a reflection of your unit's talents and resources. When selecting your program idea, please keep the theme in mind and then let your imagination run wild!

When submitting your registration, please indicate the amount of space your event will need (each area is a 10 ft x 10 ft area). We will make every effort to accommodate you. If you have any questions about the suitability or feasibility of your program, contact your District's Makahiki Participation Chairperson.
